Social Futures is challenging stereotypes about disability in Central Western NSW and on the NSW Central Coast through the 'Different on the Outside, Same on the Inside' (DOSI) program.

This free program for students helps break down misconceptions and social barriers, and encourages awareness and inclusion for people with disability.

DOSI is proudly delivered by Social Futures Local Area Coordinators for the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

In Central Western NSW, Prue McCarthy shares her experience of living with Cerebral Palsy and talks about the importance of disability not defining the person.

On the Central Coast, Maree Jenner engages young people by speaking to her own experience of difference as a person of short stature, and the challenges faced by 'growing up little' in a world built for average height people.
